# Agenda Items of the Meeting was circulated among the Members IQAC

The Resolutions adopted in the Meeting were as follows:

Item No. 1. To read and confirm the Minutes of the previous Meeting of IQAC dated 17/07/2020.

#### Resolution No. 1

The Minutes of the previous Meeting of IQAC held on 17/07/2020 were read out by IQAC Coordinator Asst. Prof. Dr. Mangesh V. Kadu. Corrections, if any, were invited. No corrections were found. Resolutions were unanimously approved by all the Members of IQAC.

Item No. 2 To table the Audited Statement of Income and Expenditure for the Financial Year 2020-2021.

#### Resolution No.2

The Principal placed before the Members of IQAC, the Audited Statement of Income and Expenditure for the Financial Year 2020-2021. The Members of IQAC verified the Audited Statements of Income and Expenditure and found everything in order. The Resolution was unanimously approved by all the Members of IQAC.

Item No.3 To initiate the Re-accreditation process of the Institution at the earliest.

#### Resolution No.3

The IQAC coordinator impressed upon all the Members of IQAC about the urgency of completing the data compilation of AQAR from the Academic Session 2015-2016 to 2021-2022. He said that enough time had been elapsed and the NAAC may not extend the time limit for submission of AQAR. He also informed that NAAC has introduced new Guidelines for Reaccreditation. The data presently available with the teachers concerned would again be filled into the new Formats to comply with the new guidelines of AQAR Format. Resolution was unanimously approved by all the Members of IQAC.

Item No.4 To review the Institutional Social Responsibilities during COVID-19 Pandemic. Resolution No.4

The IQAC Coordinator informed the Members that the teaching and non-teaching staff of the College contributed enormously during the COVID-19 Pandemic period for Charity as part of their Institutional Social Responsibilities. The Institution, under the aegis of N.S.S. Unit distributed food grains and other essential items for distribution among the poor people including the Migrant labourers. #### Introduction

The Summary of Internal Quality Assurance Cell for the Academic Session 2021-2022 is as follows:

### **Curricular Aspects**

As per the Perspective Plan of the Institution -2020-2025; yearly planning has been chalked out and accordingly all the activities have been planned and executed. Effective Curriculum dissemination was carried out as per our Academic Calendar, which was prepared and implemented in conformity with University's Academic Calendar. The Principal, through the Time Table Committee, allocated subject-wise workload and time slots to teachers. To ensure the genuineness, the Daily Work Book has been endorsed by the Principal. The Annual Teaching Plan, prepared by the faculty and endorsed by the Principal, provides an effective dissemination of syllabus through planned outcomes.

Bridge Courses, Remedial Classes for Slow Learners, examinations along with co-curricular and extra-curricular activities were conducted. The Attendance Committee, the Syllabus Compliance Committee and the Examination Committee kept a tab on the completion of the tasks assigned. Guest lectures were conducted to give learning a different perspective.

Unit Tests and Terminal Examinations were conducted through Google platforms, which ensured continuous assessment and feedback of the students.

E-Learning resources like lecture notes, references, hand-outs, question bank, teaching plans and topic-wise PPTs, subject related videos and Moodle Courses were uploaded on Google Classrooms and WhatsApp Groups. Transparent and Continuous Internal Assessment Mechanism was implemented in the Institution for assessing students' progress throughout the programme schedule. As notified by R.T.M. Nagpur University in its Website, students were informed about the examination scheme and also about the internal marking pattern for bringing more transparency to the evaluation system.

#### **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

The Institution has well maintained infrastructural facilities for running cultural activities, sports and games (Indoor and Outdoor), Indoor Gymnasium, Green Gymnasium and Yoga and Meditation. The optimum use of the facilities available in the Institution is always ensured.

The Institution has 14 Classrooms and one Seminar Hall with Wi-Fi and LAN facilities. The Classrooms were used by faculty during intermittent lift on lockdown to reach out to students online. Expenditure for infrastructure augmentation excluding salary during the year (INR in Lakhs) was Rs. 471764/-. Annual expenditure of purchase of books/e-books and subscription to journals/e-journals during the year (INR in Lakhs) was Rs. 128176/-

A total Number of Senior College students and teachers who visited the library during the Academic Session 2021-2022 was 4721. A total of 128 faculties and students have recorded their footfalls which sums up to 16.92 % use of library per day.

Class rooms are festooned with Interactive Boards, Smart Boards, complete Surveillance System, uninterrupted power back-up with 25 KVA Generator, facility for high-speed communication links, anti-virus for all Computers for the smooth delivery of all its programmes. Our Institution has 95 computers and 3 laptops. We have legal Libman Software for Library Management, CMS software for Office Management, Tally Software and Master Software's dedicated Software for Accounting and ETNL Software for English Language Laboratory. The students-Computer ratio amounts to 1: 7.31 with a total of 717 students in the current Academic Session. The bandwidth of the internet connectivity is  $\geq$  **50MBPS.** 

A total of Rs. 493964/- expenditure was incurred on maintenance of infrastructure (Physical and academic support facilities) excluding salary component during the year. The Institution has established mechanisms for maintaining and utilizing various support facilities, which include laboratory, library, sports amenities, Computers, classrooms and other facilities. Optimum allocation and utilization of existing and generated resources for the maintenance of various facilities was ensured as mentioned in the Annual Budget.

The 'Students' Grievance and Redressal Cell' addressed students' grievances especially issues related with University's examination through Digital Mode. The 'Anti-Ragging Cell' of the Institution was active and even after the lifting of the Lockdown restrictions and the resuming of regular classes no untoward incident has been reported. Students have organized programmes like Lectures, Workshops, Aids Awareness and De-addiction Rallies, Blood Donation Camps,

Tree Plantation Drives, Cleanliness Drives, Republic Day, Independence Day, International Yoga Day, National Voters' Day and NSS Pandharwada, Sports and Cultural Events.

Bhiwapur Mahavidyalaya's Alumni Association is a registered body under Societies Registration Act, 1860. The Alumni assisted the Institution in organizing various curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities by giving the students ample trainings in One Act Plays, Skits on various social issues, Drama, Dance and other Sports Items.

#### Governance, Leadership and Management

Some of the Strategies to achieve improvisations in the sustenance of Quality Education were decided as given below:

- Augmentation of Infrastructure.
- Introduction of Add-on Courses / Value Added Courses / Self-financing Courses as part of Skill Development Initiative.
- Proposals to start Post graduate Courses and Research Centre in different disciplines.
- Improving collaborative activities and making MoUs functional.
- Empower students through Entrepreneurship Development Cell and Training and Placement Cell.
- To enhance and synchronize ICT enabled and Traditional Method for effective Curriculum delivery.

As per the strategic plan of the Institution, the Courses under the Skill Development Initiative like Tally, Beauty Culture and 22 other skill-oriented Courses under the flagship of One Student One Skill Programme (OSOSP) run by the Institute with the affiliation of Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University aim and function unceasingly for the empowerment of the students in making them financially independent.

Internal Financial Audit and External Audit

Internal Financial Audit was done to keep track on the administrative expenses incurred during the Financial Year. The Audit includes financial transactions resulting from salary grants, non-salary grants, unaided Courses, grants received from UGC and Scholarships.

External Audit which is conducted by an independent Finance Officer seated in the Joint Director's office. The Office of the Accountant General has a provision of looking into the Audited Statements submitted every five years.

#### **Institutional Values and Best Practices**

The Institution adheres to the guidelines of Statutory Bodies regarding the management of

degradable and non-degradable waste. Notices to this effect were affixed on Notice Boards for educating our stakeholders. Waste Management is managed by disposing off the e- waste and Solid Waste through proper mechanisms. The wet solid waste and dry solid waste are stored in red and green coloured Bins separately. Bhiwapur Mahavidyalaya entered into working MOU with M/s SURITEX PVT. LTD for collection, Transportation and Recycling of E-Waste.

The wet solid waste and dry solid waste are stored in red and green coloured Bins separately. Degradable waste like garden waste and canteen waste are collected and the vermicomposting technique is used to fasten the pace of decomposing with the help of earthworms and cow dung.

#### **Under Control of Cont**

An Awareness Rally on Cleanliness and Eradication of Plastic was organized on 20<sup>th</sup> Oct 2021. Constitution Day was celebrated on 26<sup>th</sup> November 2021 with 50 participants.

Our students participated in the University Level Quiz Competition arranged by L D Balkhande College of Arts and Commerce, Pauni. Ku. Pradyna Kalarkar and Ku. Rinku Ramesh Meshram won third positions.

#### **Gender Equity and Sensitization**

The Institution is aware of its accountability towards women and hence their safety, security and well-being on Campus are our utmost priority. The percentage of women enrolled in our Institution is comparatively more than that of the percentage of boys enrolled. In 2021-2022, against 33% of enrollment of girl students in NCC and NSS, we enrolled 33 % and 73 % of girl students respectively. Girls' Common room with a Sanitary Napkin Vending Machine, Cardiac Section in Gymnasium and separate MPSC study room are the other facilities open for the girl students. Women's Hostel facility is available for 60 girl students.

Guest Lecture of Mrs. Vijaya Marotkar was organized on "PORI JARA JAPUN" (Trans. Eng. GIRLS BE CAUTIOUS). Students of both the genders were given equal opportunities in all the activities for maintaining gender equity and sensitization in curricular and co-curricular activities.

The Anti-Ragging Cell ensures dissemination of information on ragging and its repercussions on

them. Students' Grievance and Redressal Cell along with Students' Counseling Centre caters to the students' issues. Participation of Women in ICC, NCC, NSS and all the co-curricular and extra-curricular Committees are ensured. Complaint Boxes are installed in the College where students can drop in their complaints.

#### **Extension and Outreach Programmes**

The Institution realizes its Institutional Social Responsibilities. The Institution through its extension activities ensures equality while discharging its social responsibilities in public Sphere as well as in the Institution.

#### **Cultural Activities**

The Cultural Committee identifies the regional cultures and plans activities accordingly to give wider exposure to students through dance, drama, and prevalent folk culture. This in turn helps the students to value and respect the culture and traditions of different regions.

#### **Awards and Recognitions**

In all 14 awards/appreciation letters were given to the Institution for its Extension activities- for organizing Blood Donation Camps and also for coordinating and collaborating with various Government Bodies for conducting Awareness Campaigns.



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









College has 04 KWp solar photovoltaic roof top grid connected system installed college building. **Its Appreciable**.

#### AREA OF IMPROVEMENT

#### **↓** LIGHTING SYSTEM

Replacement of "conventional T-12 (40 Watt) and T-8 (36 Watt)" tube light by energy efficient LED lighting fixture was taken up phased manner.

#### **TIMER CONTROLLED STREET LIGHTS**

Installation of "Timer control on Focus Light and street lighting" in college campus is recommended.

#### CEILING FAN AND EXHAUST FAN:

Replacement of "conventional ceiling fan (60 Watt)" by energy efficient star rated fan or BLDC based energy efficient fan (25 Watt) in "admin building, class rooms, and faculties cabin" have great potential for energy saving.


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


#### **COLLEGE LAYOUT OF VARIOUS FLOORS**

#### 1.5 About Energy Audit

Energy audit helps to understand more about the ways energy is used in any plant and helps in identifying areas where waste may occur and scope for improvement exists. The overall energy efficiency from generation to final consumer becomes 50%. Hence one unit saved in the end user is equivalent to two units generated in the power plant.

Energy audit is the most efficient way to identify the strength and weakness of energy management practices and to find a way to solve problems. Energy audit is a professional approach in utilizing economic, financial, and social and natural resources responsibility. Energy audits "adds value" to management control and is a way of evaluating the system.

Empirical Exergy Private Limited (EEPL), Indore M.P. carried out the "Energy Audit" at the site to find gaps in the energy consumption pattern for Bhiwapur Mahavidyalaya, Bhiwapur Dist. Nagpur, Maharashtra. A technical report is prepared as per the need and the requirement of the project.

#### 1.6 Objectives of Energy Auditing

An energy audit provides vital information base for overall energy conservation program covering essentially energy utilization analysis and evaluation of energy conservation measures. It aims at:

- Identifying the quality and cost of various energy inputs.
- Assessing present pattern of energy consumption in different cost centers of operations.
- Relating energy inputs and production output.
- Identifying potential areas of thermal and electrical energy economy.
- Highlighting wastage in major areas.
- Fixing of energy saving potential targets for individual cost centers.
- Implementation of measures for energy conservation & realization of savings.





#### 1.7 Methodology:

Methodology adopted for achieving the desired objectives viz.: Assessment of the current operational status and energy savings include the following:

- ♣ Discussions with the concerned officials for identification of major areas of focus and other related systems.
- → Team of engineers visited the site and had discussions with the concerned officials / supervisors to collected data / information on the operations and load distribution within the plant and same for the overall premises. The data was analyzed to arrive at a base line energy consumption pattern.
- ♣ Measurements and monitoring with the help of appropriate instruments including continuous and / or time-lapse recording, as appropriate and visual observations were made to identify the energy usage pattern and losses in the system.
- **♣** Trend analysis of costs and consumptions.
- ♣ Capacity and efficiency test of major utility equipment's, wherever applicable.
- **♣** Estimation of various losses
- ♣ Computation and **in-depth analysis** of the collected data, including utilization of computerized analysis and other techniques as appropriate were done to draw inferences and to evolve suitable energy conservation plan/s for improvements/ reduction in specific energy consumption.




Figure 2.1: Graphical Presentation of Unit Consumption Year-2020-21




Figure :- Graphical Presentation of connected load Year-2020-21











Figure 2.4 :- Electrical Equipment in College







# EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The executive summary of the Environment audit report furnished in this section briefly gives the identified water conservation measures, that can be implemented in a phased manner to water conservation and increase the productivity of the college.

### AREAS FOR IMPROVEMENT AND RECOMMENDATION

### FRESH WATER MONITORING SYSTEM:

- ♣ Installation of "Cloud based (IoT based) ground water extraction monitoring system" for Borewell to quantify fresh water consumption per day in the College.
- ♣ Install water flow meters (Mechanical or Electronics) in distribution network, like college building, main line and gardening line for quantity per day water consumption and waste water generation in the College campus.

### WASTE WATER TREATMENT PLANT

♣ Waste water generated from various departments and canteen should be collect in separate waste water collection tank. It should be treated in proposed STP. after that treated water reuse activity like gardening, toilet and wash room etc.

### **USE EFFICIENT WATER TAPS**

♣ Water saving taps either reduce water flow or automatically switch off to help save water. So, it is highly recommended to install efficient water taps in university campus to reducewater consumption.

### USE EFFICIENT URINAL TAPS.

♣ Replacing these inefficient fixtures with water sense labelled flushing urinal can save between 0.5 to 04 litter per flush without sacrificing performance. Installing water saving flushing urinal will not only reduce water use in facilities but also save money on water bills.

### INSTALLATION OF WATER OVERFLOW SENSOR IN TANKS.

♣ It is observed that water overflow in overhead tanks after filling. So tank, it is recommended installation of water overflow sensor to avoid water overflow.

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
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




Figure 2.3: Technology for Drip Water Irrigation for plant




Figure 2.4: Waste water generation sources in college campus.











### 1.4 About Green Auditing

# Chapter-04 Carbon Foot print

### 4.1 About carbon foot print.

Climate change is one of the greatest challenges facing nations, governments, institutions, business and mankind today.

Carbon footprint is a measure of the impact your activities have on the amount of carbon dioxide (CO<sub>2</sub>) produced through the burning of fossil fuels and is expressed as a weight of CO<sub>2</sub>emissions produced in tonnes.

We focus on consumption in each of our five major categories: housing, travel, food, products and services. In addition to these we also estimate the share of national emissions over which we have little control, government purchases and capital investment.

For simplicity and clarity all our calculations follow one basic method. We multiply a use input by an emissions factor to calculate each footprint. All use inputs are per individual and include things like fuel use, distance, calorie consumption and expenditure. Working out your inputs is a matter of estimating them from your home, travel, diet and spending behaviour.

Although working out you inputs can take some investigation on your part the much more challenging aspect of carbon calculations is estimating the appropriate emissions factor to use in your calculation. Where possible you want this emissions factor to account for as much of the relevant life cycle as possible.

### 4.2 Methodology and Scope

The carbon footprint gives a general overview of the College greenhouse gas emissions, converted into CO<sub>2</sub> -equivalents and it is based on reported data from internal and external systems. The purposes of the carbon indicators are to measure the carbon intensity per unit of product, in addition to showing environmental transparency towards external stakeholders. The carbon footprint reporting approach undertaken in this study follows the guidelines and principles set out in the "Greenhouse Gas Protocol Corporate Accounting and Reporting Standard" (hereafter referred to as the GHG Protocol) developed by the Greenhouse Gas Protocol Initiative and international standard for the quantification and reporting of greenhouse gas emissions -ISO 14064. This is the most widely used and accepted methodology for conducting corporate carbon footprints. The study has assessed carbon emissions from the College Campus. This involves accounting for, and reporting on, the GHG emissions from all those activities for which the company is directly responsible. The items quantified in this study are as classified under the ISO 14064 standards: The report calculates the greenhouse gas emissions from the College. This includes electricity, as well as emission associated with diesel consumption in the institute vehicle. The emission associated with air travel, waste generation, administration, and marketing related activities has been excluded from the current study. Emissions from business activities are generally classified as scope 1, 2 or 3 areas classified under the ISO 14064 standards.

### 4.3 Carbon emission from Electricity

Direct emissions factors are widely published and show the amount of emissions produced by power stations in order to produce an average kilowatt-hour within that grid region

Unlike with other energy sources the carbon intensity of electricity varies greatly depending on how it is produced and transmitted. For most of us, the electricity we use comes from the grid and is produced from a wide variety of sources. Although working out the carbon intensity of this mix is difficult, most of the work is generally done for us.

Electricity used in the site is the significant contributors towards GHGs emission from the unit. Electricity used onsite is the most direct, and typically the most significant, a contributor to a unit's carbon footprint. Thus, using an average fuel mix of generating electricity, carbon dioxide intensity of electricity for national grid is assumed to be 0.9613 KgCO2/Kwh

#### 4.6 Other Emissions Excluded

This study did not evaluate the carbon sequestration potential of existing plantation activities and emission from the staff commuting, food supply, official flights, paper products, water supply, and waste disposal and recycling due to limited data availability. The current study identifies areas where data monitoring, recording and archiving need to be developed for enlarging the scope of mapping of GHGs emission in the future years. Accordingly, a set of tools and record keeping procedure will be developed for improving the quality of data collection for the next year carbon footprint studies.





#### CHAPTER- 5 WASTE MANAGEMENT

#### **5.1 About Waste:**

Human activities create waste, and it is the way these wastes are handled, stored, collected and disposed of, which can pose risks to the environment and to public health Waste management is important for an eco-friendly campus. In college different types of wastes are generated, its collection and management are very challenging.

Solid waste can be divided into three categories: bio-degradable, non-biodegradable and hazardous waste. A bio-degradable waste includes food wastes, canteen waste, wastes from toilets etc. Non-biodegradable wastes include what is usually thrown away in homes and schools such as plastic, tins and glass bottles etc. Hazardous waste is waste that is likely to be a threat to health or the environment like cleaning chemicals, acids and petrol.

Unscientific management of these wastes such as dumping in pits or burning them may cause harmful discharge of contaminants into soil and water supplies, and produce greenhouse gases contributing to global climate change respectively. Special attention should be given to the handling and management of hazardous waste generated in the college. Bio-degradable waste can be effectively utilized for energy generation purposes through anaerobic digestion or can be converted to fertilizer by composting technology. Non-biodegradable waste can be utilized through recycling and reuse. Thus the minimization of solid waste is essential to a sustainable college. The auditor diagnoses the prevailing waste disposal policies and suggests the best way to combat the problems.

• Frame long-term eco-restoration programmes for replacing exotic Acacia plantations with indigenous trees and need of the hour is to frame a holistic campus development plan.







#### **6.2 Other Suggestions**


